## **Transgender, Two-Spirit, Gender-Expansive and Intersex (TGI) Media Research Guide**

The UCLA Film & Television Archive holds a wide selection of motion picture and television titles made by or depicting transgender, two-spirit, gender-expansive and intersex (TGI) people. These moving images span from the early 20th century to today and provide an opportunity to survey a complex history of representations related to TGI people within the commercial mainstream media—made by predominately cisgender filmmakers—and the diverse range of productions from TGI media makers.

Most cinema and media studies writings about media and TGI people emphasize on-screen representation rather than work by TGI creators. Laura Horak’s article, “Tracing the History of Trans and Gender Variant Filmmakers” (*Transgender Media*, 2017), and the development of the [Transgender Media Portal](#) are helping to change this narrative. In reflecting the scope of the Archive’s holdings, this research guide draws on how Horak uses the terms “trans” and “gender variant” to encompass people who find or historically have found any of the following terms meaningful for themselves: “transgender,

transsexual, transvestite,” “butches, faeries, sissies, drag queens, drag kings, *travestis*, intersex people, and professional gender impersonators” (Horak, p. 10). Other key scholars in this subject area are Jack Halberstam, Cáel M. Keegan, Helen Hok-Sze Leung, José Esteban Muñoz, Eliza Steinbock and Susan Stryker.

## **Outfest UCLA Legacy Project Collection**

With over 41,000 holdings in the collection, the Outfest UCLA Legacy Project has established itself as the leading archive for LGBTQ moving image media preservation. The first of its kind and landmark in its scope, the Legacy Project contains a diverse range of LGBTQ media, from rare titles (the Gay Girls Riding Club's *Spy on the Fly*, *The Roman Spring of Mrs. Stone* and *Always on Sunday*) to more well-known films (Jamie Babbit's *But I'm A Cheerleader*) and influential independent works (Sankofa Film and Video's *The Passion of Remembrance*). ## **GLAAD Trans and Intersex Media Collection**

Holdings: 1984, 1992, 1999-2006

The Gay & Lesbian Alliance Against Defamation (GLAAD) is a non-profit organization of LGBT activism that is dedicated to promoting and ensuring fair, accurate and inclusive representation of people and events in the media as a means of eliminating homophobia and discrimination based on gender identity and sexual orientation. This collection of reference videocassettes and DVDs documents GLAAD's designation of positive and defamatory media portrayals of trans and intersex people. The collection consists predominantly of television entertainment programming such as the 2003 Court TV coverage of the Michael Kantares trial (a trans man seeking custody of his children), 2002 media coverage of the killing of transgender teen Gwen Araujo and portrayals of transgender and intersex people in made-for-TV movies, documentaries and television series such as *The Sopranos*, *Ally McBeal*, *Friends*, *Nip/tuck*, *The Oprah Winfrey Show*, *Dr. Phil*, *Entourage* and *Ugly Betty*. The collection consists of 1/2-inch VHS videocassettes, 1/2-inch Betacam SP videocassettes and DVDs.

Produced by the City of West Hollywood and airing on cable stations throughout the country, the public affairs talk show *Get Used to It* (1992-2012) addressed national and local issues impacting the LGBTQ+ community. Hosted by Sheila James Kuehl, the first openly gay or lesbian person to be elected to the California Legislature, the series brought together advocates and allies for thoughtful conversations, delving into landmark cases and legislation for equal rights, issues related to LGBTQ+ youth, race and racism in the community, immigration, education, faith and spirituality, HIV/AIDS, and much more.
